Is Zimbabwe achieving universal electricity access?

Despite recent achievements, Zimbabwe's electricity sector still faces power supply deficits and slow progress toward universal electricity access. Peak electricity demand is projected to grow substantially, and achieving universal electricity access will require large investments, especially in solar power and grid expansion.

Why does Zimbabwe have a power supply deficit?

The weak financial state of Zimbabwe's electricity companies is the most significant issue driving the country's power supply deficits and slowing the expansion of universal access to electricity services. Energy tariffs do not reflect the financial costs of energy generation and distribution, leading to significant losses for power companies.

What causes Zimbabwe's interconnected problems of electricity supply & access?

The ZEU finds that Zimbabwe's interconnected problems of electricity supply and access are ultimately driven by three underlying issues: weak financial performance of energy companies, insufficient central planning and coordination, and limited private sector participation.

How much electricity does Zimbabwe need?

As of mid-November, total electricity generation across Zimbabwe stood at just 1,189 megawatts, almost half of the national demand. Gata noted that high demand from the mining sector, which is experiencing an annual growth rate of 9% driven by lithium, coal, iron, and steel, has further compounded the shortfall.
